The co-founder of the anti-abortion movement in New Zealand was Professor Sir William Liley, an obstetrician and gynaecologist at National Women's Hospital, who in 1963 pioneered blood transfusions to rH babies in utero. He also pioneered the medical speciality of perinatology, the science of care for preborn babies and high-risk pregnancies, becoming known as the "Father of Foetology".

Bill Liley argued that medical science revealed the preborn baby to be a human person from conception, deserving of life and protection.

Nobody in the NZ medical establishment would debate him on the medical science.

The co-founder of the abortion movement in the United States, Dr Bernard Nathanson, later became pro-life and on arrival in Auckland in 1982 said: "I can't wait to meet Bill Liley! You know we O&Gs in the United States have the greatest respect for him. We can't understand why he wasn't awarded the Nobel Prize."
